

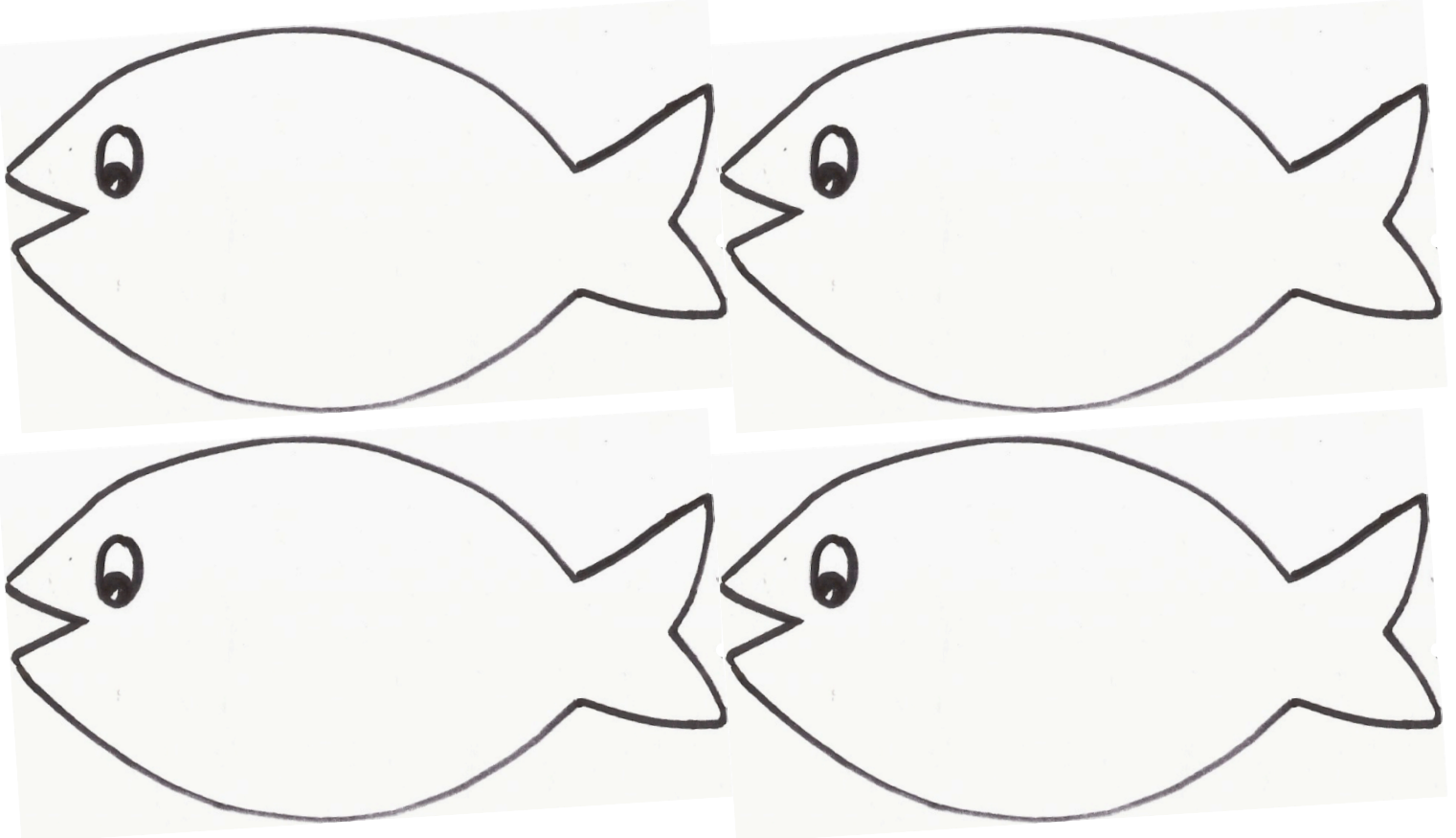
# Beatrix Potter Teatime Book Club—Wk 7

## Jeremy Fisher's Fancy Fish

Vivid descriptions in stories are what make stories so interesting and memorable. Here are examples of some from *The Lion, the Witch, and the Wardrobe*, by C.S. Lewis:

“...the courtyard was now a blaze of colours; glossy chestnut sides of centaurs, indigo horns of unicorns, dazzling plumage of birds, reddy-brown of foxes, dogs and satyrs, yellow stockings and crimson hoods of dwarfs; and the birch-girls in silver, and the beech-girls in fresh, transparent green, and the larch-girls in green so bright that it was almost yellow.”

1. Color the fish, and write unique descriptions on each.
2. Make a pond scene in your notebook, and glue the fish onto the scene.
3. If you want to use your fish in a fishing day play activity before adding them to the notebook, you can use a hole puncher to make a hole, either near their mouths or on their tails. Tie a string to a long stick, with an open paperclip attached to the end of the string. The paperclip will serve as a hook. Place the fish in a pail or bowl, hole side up, and then “go fishing!” Make sure to add your fish to your notebooks afterwards.



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
